Link between Academic Goal and Coursework	This is the preparatory course for the participation in the Conference <i>Tsukuba English Model United Nations</i> (TEMUN) to be held 9-11 Dec 2015.
Course Objective	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ To acquire mindset and skills to understand their counterparts' position in positively listening to them and to strategically claim one's own positions and opinions in gaining mutual trust ○ To get accustomed to the process of reaching a settlement over conflicting issues through discussion, debate and dialogue with counterparts ○ To be able to summarize different ideas and opinions of a group under given conditions ○ To acquire formulaic expressions relevant for formal addresses and writing official papers for international conferences
Course Overview	Specifically for international conferences, students will learn how to speak in English, how to behave according to procedures (roll call, agenda setting, formal debate, moderated caucus, unmoderated caucus, draft resolution, amendments, vote on resolution, etc.), and how to use idiomatic expressions in resolutions. Students will experience a real consensus-building process in participating in a simulated conference (TEMUN) to discuss an authentic agenda of an international organization.

Syllabus(English)	[Session 1] Introduction to Model United Nations (MUN) and Rules of Procedure (role-call, setting time limit on speeches, formal and informal debate on country

background and pre-course readings related to the agenda, and suspending the meeting).

[Session 2] Rules of procedure, formal debate, moderated, unmoderated caucusing and caucus of the whole on country policy related to items on the agenda. Writing position papers and working papers, and developing a negotiation strategy.

[Session 3] Rules of procedure, formal debate and caucusing on working papers. Writing and introducing draft resolutions and amendments.

[Session 4] Rules of procedure, introducing and debating a draft resolution, closing the speaker's list and debate and voting procedures on amendments and draft resolutions, and adjourning the meeting. Strategy for the MUN.
